



CHECKLIST

Use this checklist to evaluate your home's security. Boxes marked "no" indicate areas where you should take action to **"harden the target"** and decrease your chances of a home burglary.

FRONT ENTRANCE

The front door has solid core construction

The door has a peephole with a 190-degree view

The deadbolt lock has a minimum 1-inch throw

The strike plate is installed with a minimum of two 3-inch screws

Glass or mail drop within 40 inches of the door – the door is equipped with a double-cylinder deadbolt

(In case of an emergency, the key is always kept nearby.)

The door lock is in good working order



Driveway/pathway motion detector alert

(should be used with a front screen or Dutch doors)

Double Doors - have a bolt securing the top and bottom of the non-locking door

The porch light automatically comes on from dusk to dawn

The front of the home is equipped with a doorbell camera that allows communication through a smartphone

SIDE/REAR ENTRANCES

The following doors have double cylinder deadbolt locks

- French Doors with multiple window panes
- Doors with pet entrances
- Doors with upper glass panels

Porch lights come on automatically from dusk to dawn

All exterior door locks are in good working order

All doors with exterior hinges are equipped with hinge protection

French Doors - have a bolt securing the top and bottom of the non-locking door

SLIDING PATIO DOORS

The sliding glass door does not lift out of the track

The lock is in proper working order

There is a secondary lock or wooden dowel used to secure the door

WINDOWS



Ground Floor

Sliding Windows:

- Are equipped with lift protection, which prevents the window from being lifted out of the track (see image above) Yes No
- Are equipped with a wooden dowel or a secondary locking device Yes No

Casement Windows - have double locks and are in good working order Yes No

Double Hung Windows – have window pins or similar secondary locking devices (many new windows are difficult to secure with a secondary lock) Yes No

Louver Windows – all glass panels have epoxy securing them to the frame Yes No

All windows are free of exterior obstructions that block their view Yes No

Second floor windows – should be secured in the same manner as above

Windows cannot be easily accessed from a wall, roof, balcony, tree, or with the use of patio furniture Yes No

Ladders are stored inside or locked to a stationary device Yes No

GARAGES



Garage Overhead Door

Garage door has an automatic garage door opener with a “remote lock” button, which is activated nightly and when on vacation Yes No

Garage door has a vacation bolt or hole in the track for a padlock that is used when on vacation Yes No

The garage door is kept closed and locked when not in use Yes No

The door leading into the house is equipped with a single cylinder deadbolt lock Yes No



All windows are secured with a secondary lock or wooden dowel Yes No

If no automatic garage door opener, the door is secured with a padlock Yes No

The utility box is secured with a padlock Yes No

Garage Pedestrian Door

The door is of solid core construction Yes No

The door is equipped with a deadbolt lock (use a single cylinder deadbolt unless there is a window within 40 inches) Yes No

Door is equipped with a window or peephole if a window is not nearby Yes No



POINTS TO REMEMBER

- ✓ Most burglars knock before they attempt to enter your home - acknowledge you are home through a closed door or use a doorbell camera that allows you to communicate with the unknown visitor, even when you are not at home.
- ✓ Always lock all doors and windows any time you are away, even for a short walk or a quick errand.
 - This includes setting your burglar alarm. An alarm can be a powerful deterrent and should include an audible alarm, window and door sensors, monitoring and motion sensors. (Don't forget to put a motion sensor in the master bedroom - often a burglar's first stop.)
 - Alarm permits are required in Newport Beach (\$59 for a three-year period). Alarm Office: 949-644-3723
- ✓ Never hide a key under your doormat; it is like a free pass to any would be burglar. Instead, give a spare key to a trusted friend or neighbor.
- ✓ When you go on vacation, request a **FREE Vacation Check** from the Newport Beach Police Department by calling 949-644-3681. Also ask a trusted neighbor to watch your home.
- ✓ If you arrive home and see a broken window or open door, do not enter. Put yourself in a safe place and call 9-1-1 immediately. If you enter and encounter an intruder, do not attempt to detain him/her, they may be armed. **a.** Your property is replaceable, you are not!
